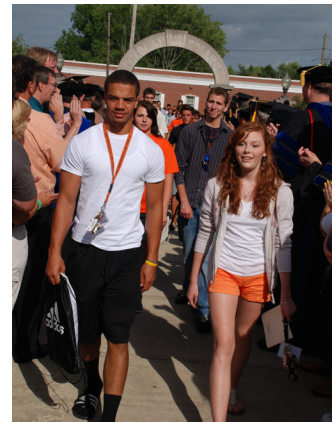

1. What's Happening on Campus?

Classes begin at the University on Monday, Aug. 22. New students will arrive on campus Thursday, Aug. 18, for orientation weekend. Many activities are planned, including a campus-wide scavenger hunt and welcome sessions by each college. The arch ceremony will be held at 4:30 p.m. Friday, Aug. 18, followed by a reception for new students and farewell to parents and families taking place on the front lawn of Old Main. On Saturday, students, faculty and staff will participate in service projects, organized by Campus Compact. Other activities for students will include giant inflatables, bingo and live entertainment.



The Mazza Museum at The University of Findlay announced July 13 the acquisition of 2,700 pieces of original artwork by famed children's book artist and author Steven Kellogg.

The acquisition represents a 50-percent expansion of the Mazza's collection of more than 5,000 pieces, bringing the total to more than 7,700 pieces of original artwork. The acquisition was made possible, in part, by a \$350,000 gift from actor Anthony Edwards, best known for

his starring role on the television show "ER." Some of Kellogg's popular work includes "Island of the Skog," "Johnny Appleseed," "A Rose for Pinkerton," "How Much is a Million" and "The Day Jimmy's Boa Ate the Wash." Readers may recognize characters such as The Christmas Witch, Pinkerton and Rose, Jimmy and Jimmy's Boa, and Clorinda from Kellogg's work. The University of Findlay recently was awarded a \$7,500 grant from the Findlay-Hancock County Community Foundation to offer Communication Matters: A Public Relations Boot Camp for Nonprofit Organizations in Hancock County. 2. Academic Update

The University of Findlay's computer science, pharmacy and biology programs have been designated Programs of Innovation by the state of Ohio, which also awarded the University a grant to offer Choose Ohio First (COF) scholarships to students in those fields of study. The primary objectives of the Choose Ohio First Scholarship Program (COFSP) are to support increased higher education participation and success of Ohio students majoring in STEMM and STEMM education fields (science, technology, engineering, mathematics and medicine) and, in so

doing, to advance the economic growth of each region of the state. Scholarships will be awarded in the fall of 2012 and may provide up to \$4,700 per student. Recipients must be Ohio residents and meet academic requirements defined by the University. Since 2008, grant-funded Choose Ohio First scholarships also are offered at Findlay for students seeking to become licensed teachers of mathematics and science at the middle school and high school levels. The University of Findlay's Josephine Kershaw, Ph.D., associate professor of health care management, recently was named the ACBSP International Teaching Excellence Award recipient for 2011. The Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs recognizes individuals each year who exemplify teaching excellence in the classroom. As the 2011 Teaching Excellence Award recipient for the Great Lakes Council — ACBSP Region 4, Kershaw was honored with other regional recipients, each of whom received a medallion and a \$100 check. From that group, two International Teaching Excellence Award recipients were announced, one from a baccalaureate/graduate degree-granting institution and one from an associate degree-granting institution. Kershaw received the International Award, representing baccalaureate/graduate degree granting institutions, and was presented with an engraved plaque and a \$500 check. The Chronicle of Higher Education featured Ray McCandless, D.A., director of the Center for Teaching Excellence and professor of political science and public administration, in “Teaching Students to Write a Case Study,” published July 5. McCandless’ unique approach to using case studies in his courses caught the attention of Chronicle writer James M. Lang, who met McCandless during a spring visit to the University. When McCandless created a public administration concentration in UF’s MBA program in the 1990s, instead of using traditional case studies as teaching tools, he asked students to write their own. Wilkin Chair for the College of Liberal Arts, Matthew Stolick, Ph.D., associate professor of philosophy, will devote one year of study to the interdisciplinary exploration of a single topic – The Power of Play: Essential to Human Being. Stolick will introduce his topic during a presentation at 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 1, in the Alumni Memorial Union. Additional events are planned for the academic year, including a presentation by Jaco J. Hamman, author of “A Play-Full Life: Slowing Down and Seeking Peace,” on Thursday, Oct. 27. Community members also are welcome to participate in a reading group, which will meet from 6-7:30 p.m. on Thursdays beginning Sept. 8 in the AMU Endly Room; “Homo Ludens: A Study of the Play Element in Culture” by Johan Huizinga will be discussed. 4. Alumni Spotlight

Timothy Murphy: Making a Difference for the Environment

Timothy Murphy, Ph.D. (M '98), associate professor of environmental, safety and occupational health management at The University of Findlay, has a passion for protecting and preserving the environment that has defined his life. “My main interest has always been to make a difference in the environment,” he said.

He has sought to infuse that attitude into the students he teaches and mentors. In addition to teaching classes, Murphy engages students in applied research projects. Currently, a group of students are studying the use of shredded cardboard as an alternative to sawdust bedding in horse stalls, both as to cost effectiveness and improving the health and safety of people and animals.

Murphy began his career by serving two years as a public health officer in Montana after earning a bachelor’s degree in environmental health from Ferris State University in Michigan. From 1983 to 1997, he worked around the country at several companies involved in environmental remediation and emergency response cleanup.

In 1997, he enrolled in UF’s master of science in environmental, safety and health management, which took him a year to complete. With his industry experience, he was hired by the University’s environmental training center to conduct seminars at client facilities across the United States. He also developed new programs and updated the training center’s curriculum while he was taking classes toward his doctorate in environmental science at The Ohio State University.

He started teaching graduate courses for the University in 1999. “I got into education because I found that I could be part of a team that teaches a lot of students to do the same thing that I was doing, and so more work can be done,” he explained.

Murphy also participated in the Environmental Public Health Leadership Institute, sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, on a fellowship, and then he served as an instructor and mentor during the next four years. The institute experience provided a “great opportunity to improve leadership skills and mentor younger managers in the environmental public health field,” he said.

Murphy has shared his expertise internationally. He was The University of Findlay's representative to the Kake Educational Institute's new university in Chiba, Japan, which was developing a crisis management program. He gave a presentation in 2005 at the International Symposium on Crisis Management, held in Japan, and returned in 2008 as a keynote speaker.

This fall, Murphy assumes new duties as the chair of the Faculty Senate. He also was recently elected to a two-year term on the board of the national Environmental Health Science and Protection Accreditation Council.

He is eager to reconnect with alumni at the 25th anniversary celebration of the environmental program at Homecoming in October and to show off the latest research project in which two student groups living in campus environmental theme houses compete to see which can reduce energy consumption the most. The focus of Murphy's interest has changed from solid waste to sustainability issues. He paraphrased the Brundtland Commission's definition of sustainability as, "Live your life in a way today that saves resources so that future generations can live the same way."

"We can do things smarter," Murphy said. "I like to do applied research, something that the students can learn from more readily and can be applied as quickly as possible to solve a problem."

New Oilers Athletics Website

The University of Findlay Athletic Department has partnered with PrestoSports to form a new website, scheduled to be completed in early September. The new website will be the official home for all 24 of the Oilers sports programs.

Swimming and Diving

The University of Findlay men's swimming and diving program recorded the highest GPA in the nation at the NCAA Division II level during the spring semester, while the women's squad ranked fourth. The men had a cumulative grade point average of 3.65, outdistancing Missouri University of Science and Technology, which came in second at 3.35. The women meanwhile recorded a GPA of 3.52.

Individually, Ailsa Hershaw was an Academic All-American for the women with a 3.87 GPA, while Emily Thomas (4.0) and Jillian Herbst (3.52) earned honorable mention accolades. Tim Andersson-Lind was an honorable mention Academic All-American for the men's team after finishing the semester with a 3.6 GPA.

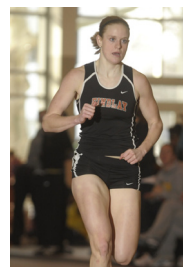
To be named an Academic All-American a student must have a GPA greater than 3.5, while qualifying for the national championship with an "A" time. Those who have a GPA greater than 3.5 and received a "B" time, without qualifying for the national championship, earn honorable mention status.

Volleyball

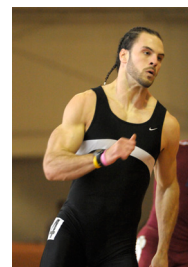
The University of Findlay women's volleyball team earned the American Volleyball Coaches' Association's Team Academic Award for the seventh straight year. The team earned a cumulative 3.58 GPA for the 2010-11 school year. Only 57 other NCAA Division II teams met the criteria to earn the AVCA's academic honors. The team's seven-year run is tied for the sixth longest current streak in Division II.

Track and Field

The University of Findlay men's and women's outdoor track and field teams each had five representatives earn Academic All-American honors from the United States Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA). For the men, John Guagenti, Greg Schaible, Curtis Smithey, Simon Bernard and Cory Vales earned the honor. On the women's side, Erin Calvelage, Randi Depp, Lindsey Schmitmeyer, Catherine Wiemers and Christine Zimmermann earned the honor.

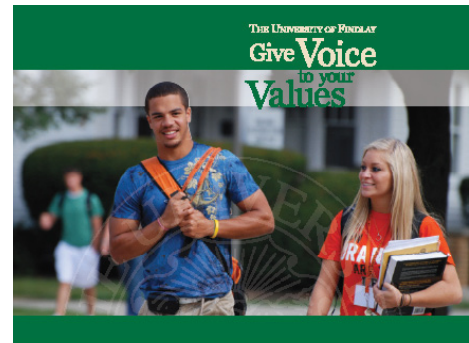

Jessica and James Moses Business Scholarship

This fund was established in honor of Mr. and Mrs. James Moses by their daughter, Pamela K. Beall. Beall is a 1978 graduate of Findlay College and a member of the Board of Trustees of The University of Findlay. Jessica (Lewis) Moses was a 1969 graduate of Findlay College, and her husband, James Moses, was an ardent believer in the free market system. The scholarship is to assist business students who have an accounting and/or economics major, and are active in Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE). Recipients must be full-time students in their junior or senior years of study and have at least a 3.0 GPA.

Jeremy L. Pemberton '96 Scholarship Endowment Fund

Jeremy L. Pemberton established this scholarship to benefit outstanding students pursuing a major within the College of Business. Pemberton graduated from The University of Findlay with a bachelor's degree in economics in 1996. This scholarship is awarded to a student who is a Dana Scholar, is in his or her junior or senior year of study and has a 3.7 GPA or better.

Pemberton Basketball Endowment Fund

Jeremy L. Pemberton, Class of 1996, established the Pemberton Basketball Endowment Fund to support the men's basketball program at the University. He created the endowment as an expression of his high esteem for the work of Ronald P. Niekamp, former head men's basketball coach, and Charles A. Ernst '92, M '06, former assistant men's basketball coach and now head coach.

Zahler Family Scholarship Endowment Fund

The family of Dennis and Dr. Barbara Zahler established the Zahler Family Scholarship Endowment Fund to assist students who wish to study abroad. Dennis Zahler graduated from Findlay College with a bachelor of science in education and business in 1970 and was named a Distinguished Alumnus in 2004.
